Asako Kremer attended the Kunitachi College of Music in her native Tokyo, Japan. She moved to New York City in 1996 and received her Master's degree from the Mannes College of Music. Ms. Kremer received a full scholarship at the University of South Carolina to serve graduate assistantship in performance. She has been a member of the Charleston Symphony Orchestra since 2003.

Damian Kremer, a native of North Carolina, has performed throughout the world as a soloist, chamber player, and orchestral musician. He has served as principal cellist for the Chautauqua Music Festival Orchestra and the Lansing Symphony, and has toured England, Scotland, and Japan with the New World Symphony. Irish Dances

Legacy is a local Irish dance school led by a Husband-Wife duo Abbey and Brent Wood, certified by Ireland in Irish Step dancing and ceilis. They have shared the Irish culture here in Charleston for the past 20 years. Boys, girls, and adults enjoy both Legacy's performance and competitive programs.

Enjoy the music and energetic half-hour demonstration of both traditional and modern Irish dancing with the Legacy Irish Dance Academy.

The history of Irish Dance

When the Celts arrived in Ireland from central Europe over two thousand years ago, they brought with them their own folk dances. Around 400 AD, after the conversion to Christianity, the new priests used the pagan style of ornamentation in illuminating their manuscripts, while the peasants retained the same qualities in their music and dancing. The Anglo-Norman conquest in the twelfth century brought Norman customs and culture to Ireland. During the eighteenth century, the dancing master appeared in Ireland. He was a wandering dancing teacher who travelled from village to village in a district, teaching dance to peasants. Dancing masters were flamboyant characters who wore bright clothes and carried staffs. The costumes worn by Irish dancers today commemorate the clothing of the past. Each school of dancing has its own distinct dancing costume. Dresses are based on the Irish peasant dress worn two hundred years ago. Most of the dresses are adorned with hand-embroidered Celtic designs, copies of the Tara brooch are often worn on the shoulder. The brooch holds a cape which falls over the back. The clothes worn by men are less embellished but steeped in history- they wear a plain kilt and jacket, with a folded cloak draped from the shoulder. Male and female dancers today wear hornpipe shoes, and for reels and jigs, soft shoes like ballet pumps are worn. Today many organizations promoting Irish dance. The Feis has been an important part of rural cultural life. The World Championships are held in Dublin at Easter where dancers from England, Ireland, USA, Canada, Australia and New Zealand compete for the World title. The Irish word céili originally referred to a gathering of neighbors in a house to have an enjoyable time, dancing, playing music and storytelling. Today it refers to an informal evening of dancing. Céilis are held in large towns and country districts where young and old enjoy together group dances.

Trappist Monks of Mepkin Abbey

Chant with the Monks of Mepkin Abbey

Gregorian chant developed mainly in western and central Europe during the 9th and 10th centuries, with later additions and redactions. Although popular legend credits Pope Gregory I with inventing Gregorian chant, scholars believe that it arose from a later Carolingian synthesis of Roman chant and Gallican chant.

Mepkin Abbey is a community of Roman Catholic monks established in 1949 on the site of the historic Mepkin Plantation located on the Cooper River, north of Charleston, South Carolina. Founded by the monks of Gethsemane in Kentucky, the brothers of Mepkin belong to the worldwide Order of Cistercians of the Strict Observance popularly known as Trappist. Following The Rule of St. Benedict, the monks at Mepkin Abbey devote their lives to prayer, spiritual study, work, and hospitality. Living by the work of their hands, the monks provide a livelihood for themselves and the poor.

The area has been known as Mepkin for centuries and was originally the estate of several historic families. The first record of the name was a 1681 grant to the sons of Sir John Coleton, one of the Lords Proprietary of South Carolina. In 1762 one of his descendants sold the land to Henry Laurens of Charleston. Laurens built his home there, and it was known as the Mepkin Plantation. In 1936 the well-known publisher Henry R. Luce bought the property. New York architect Edward Durell Stone travelled to Mepkin in 1936 to design a new house for the Luces. His wife, Clare Boothe Luce, commissioned and built an extensive landscape garden there known as the Mepkin Garden. In 1949 the Luces donated a large part of the property, including the garden, to the Trappist Order's Gethsemani Abbey.

Twenty-nine monks of the Order of Cistercians of the Strict Observance (Trappists) came from Gethsemani, Kentucky, to found the new Mepkin Abbey. With a few limitations, the Abbey and the Mepkin Gardens are open to the public daily. The monastery grounds include a graveyard containing the ashes of Henry Laurens, as well as the graves of John Laurens, Clare Boothe Luce, and Henry Luce. Its gardens are now known as the Mepkin Abbey Botanical Garden.
